Exciting new member of the fleet



Following a complete ground-up restoration at Drayton Toowoomba, this marvellous piece of art deco train design will be rolling out of Warwick on specialist trips. Built in 1939 it worked in Tasmania for most of its life, but was almost totally destroyed by fire.

It is now owned and managed by a not for profit consortium and will be based at our SDSR precinct and operate in conjunction with the Downs Explorer timetable.

The railmotor has a driver station at each end which allows for changing direction without the need to turn the vehicle.

The Flier is a diesel - mechanical vehicle, meaning the 102hp Garner diesel engine drives directly to the wheels, rather than via electric or hydraulic motors, as is the case with most locomotives.

One great advantage of DP13 over our other carriage stock is air conditioning and for those hot summer months ...a large fridge!



End of year reviews

As we come to the end of 2021 what a turnaround from the previous year.

The weather has been very kind to us allowing the use of the Steam Locomotive on most of our tours.

This year has certainly seen a great increase in patronage already with over 5.500 passengers to various locations around the Downs.

The 2022 timetable has now been planned and will be available on our website.

SDSR has been successful in obtaining in two grants for more water tanks and the extension to the carriage shed.

There have been many changes in around precinct with the moving of the Cottonvale station museum to a new location at the entrance of the precinct.

Work is also pushing ahead on carriage BL573 to become our new refreshment carriage.

We were planning to thank all our volunteers on Sunday 5th December with a Christmas trip to Stanthorpe but recent heavy rain has damaged the track, so plan B is a get together on Thursday 9th December at the precinct....all our regulars are most welcome to attend.

Queensland Rail crew were contracted to undertake track repairs within our yard, making it safer, especially for the large WATCO locomotives.

The rail is to be re-aligned to provide more undercover storage in the carriage shed. The building is also to be extended with help of a grant.





MUSEUM REPORT FOR DECEMBER 2021

Major works have been happening with the re-location of the Cottonvale Museum from within the precinct to its new location at the front of the precinct. The re-location involved the following work -

The DEET office block had to be re-located to a new position adjacent to the new renovation shed. Three pads were made to sit the building on and when it was moved it first had to be rotated 180 degrees before placing it on the pads.

Concrete slabs had to be laid for the museum buildings which now incorporate Cottonvale Station building as well as the Cottonvale Goods shed.

The museum had to be unbolted from the stumps on which it sat, and water and power disconnected.

Bellingham Crane Hire lifted the building and loaded it onto a trailer which transported it to the new site where the crane unloaded it and placed it in position on the new site.

The goods shed was then lifted from where it sat in the yard and located it next to the museum building. A water tank was also re-located to behind the DEET office block to capture rainfall for the garden beds and as an emergency supply for the loco.

Electricians then connected power to all three buildings and installed new lighting in the museum and goods shed. Garden beds were then established around the buildings and an entrance Pergola has been installed.

I would like to thank all the volunteers that have worked every week during the entire project for the efforts and dedication to the tasks at hand.

Works are still in progress, and they include -

Painting the goods shed inside and out and painting all three buildings on the outside to ensure continuity of colour scheme for the area.

Establishing the outside display items. Track extensions were laid to accommodate the mobile track items on display.

Painting and installing the signal and levers adjacent to the goods shed.

Establishing pathways within the museum area with a new entrance way between the two buildings.

Another job that is getting under way is the installation of a Café Carriage that will encompass a café bar and souvenir shop. It will be located inside the front fence and opposite the museum. It is proposed that once the carriage is installed and opened, we will be able to open the museum on weekdays and promote the facility to the community and schools in the Darling Downs region.
